



Charles W. Calomiris – Professor of Financial Institutions at the Columbia University Graduate School of Business and a Professor at Columbia’s School of International and Public Affairs. His research spans several areas, including banking, corporate finance, financial history, and monetary economics; considered to be one of the world's foremost financial historians. He received a B.A. in economics from Yale University in 1979 and a Ph.D. in economics from Stanford University in 1985 for a dissertation *Historical Perspectives on the Tax-Based Theory of Money*. Professor Calomiris is a member of the Shadow Financial Regulatory Committee, Open Market Committee, and the Financial Economists Roundtable. He is a Research Associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER) and a Visiting Research Fellow at the Research Department of the International Monetary Fund Shadow. Professor Calomiris was a Senior Fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations, is a member of the Task Force on Property Rights at the Hoover Institution, and co-directs the Project on Financial Deregulation at the American Enterprise Institute. Professor Calomiris served on the International Financial Institution Advisory Commission, a Congressional commission to advise the U.S. government on the reform of the IMF, the World Bank, the regional development banks, and the WTO. Serves or has served as a consultant or visiting scholar for the Federal Reserve Banks of New York, Chicago, Cleveland, St. Louis, and Philadelphia, the Federal Reserve Board, the World Bank, and the governments of Mexico, Argentina, Japan, China, El Salvador, Brazil, Colombia, Connecticut, and Massachusetts. Since September 2011 a member of the Advisory Scientific Committee (ASC) of the European Systemic Risk Board (ESRB) at the European Central Bank.
