



Simeon Djankov – a Bulgarian economist, currently at the Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University and the Chairman of the Board of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development EBRD. From July 2009 and until March 2013 he was the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance of Bulgaria in the government of Boyko Borisov. Prior to this Djankov was a Chief economist of the finance and private sector vice-presidency of the World Bank. In his fourteen years at the World Bank (1995-2009), he worked on regional trade agreements in North Africa, enterprise restructuring and privatization in transition economies, corporate governance in East Asia, and regulatory reforms around the world. Simeon Djankov is the creator of the annual Doing Business report, the top-selling publication of the World Bank Group. The report came out of joint research work with Professor Andrei Shleifer at Harvard University, and was inspired by Djankov's experience in overly-regulated socialist economies. Before joining the WB he had a tenure at the University of Michigan, where he defended his PhD dissertation in 1997. An alumni of "Karl Marx Institute of Economics" in Sofia (today University of National and World Economy) (1989-1992) with the highest scores nationally.

During his work at the University of Michigan and the World Bank Dr Djankov has published over 70 articles in professional journals including the American Economic Review, the Quarterly Journal of Economics, the Journal of Political Economy, the Journal of Finance, the Journal of Financial Economics. He has also co-edited the book "Resolution of Financial Crises," with Stijn Claessens and Ashoka Mody.
